Christine de Pisan. After the disastrous Battle of Agincourt in 1415, she retired to a convent. Her last work, *Le Ditié de Jehanne d’Arc* (written in 1429), is a lyrical, joyous outburst inspired by the early victories of Joan of Arc; it is the only such French-language work written during Joan’s lifetime.

Early Life. Born in Venice, Italy, in 1364, Christine de Pisan is considered a pioneering feminist writer and one of the most notable women writers of medieval times. Her father, Tommaso di Benvenuto da Pizzano, was the court astrologer for France's King Charles V. De Pisan joined her father in France at a young age, and he saw to her education.
